

Tell Me Your Story

READ:

Some family history is passed down through stories which historians call oral histories. These stories are often shared casually, during dinner or when extended family members are gathered in celebration. Stories connect families across generations and keep culture and traditions strong. Another way to learn family stories is by interviewing family members. Studs Terkel was a famous Chicagoan who interviewed hundreds of people. He recorded their stories and played them on the radio and wrote them down in books. Today, the Chicago History Museum has an oral history center named in his honor, and continues to interview people across the city to save and share their special stories.

DO:

What can you learn by interviewing an adult family member?

- Talk to a family member. Use the "Tell Me a Story" sheet to ask questions and write down answers. Feel free to add more questions on another piece of paper!
- Record the interview on a phone or other device (optional).
- Draw a picture of the story that you heard during the interview.

Approx. Time: 30—45 minutes
