

History Detective

READ:

Imagine you are a detective looking for clues to solve mysteries. The agency you work for is special, because you focus on solving historical mysteries. Today, you have been hired by a client, Ms. Nora Nostalgia, who recently moved into a very old house, built in 1881 (can you do the math to figure out how old her house is?). Over the years, many families have lived in the home, and they sometimes left things behind when they moved. Ms. Nostalgia found a trunk in her attic, full of mysterious artifacts! There were also some tags with information about the objects, but they fell off and now everything is mixed up! She has turned to your detective agency to help her identify the objects and find out how they were used. She hopes this will help her better understand the lives of the people who used to live in her house. She is also curious how the past affects us today. Do we still use any items like these? How have things changed over time?

DO:

- Use your Detective Notebook sheets to take a close look at pictures of the mysterious artifacts Nora Nostalgia found in her attic. Notice as many details as possible. (If you have a magnifying glass it may help!)
- Make at least one observation about each object and record them on your Detective Notebook sheets.
- **Match** the tags to the right artifact. Cut them out and glue or tape them with their artifact.
- Write your final ideas in the "Case Closed" section of your Detective Notebook.
- **Talk** about your findings with a family member. What object of your own would you save for people to discover and learn form many years from now?





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
