## FILLING THE VOIDS

When it comes to preserving and sharing history, what is left out is often as influential to our worldview as what gets archived or exhibited. At CHM, we value history as a tool for social justice, and this includes bringing diverse perspectives to decisions on which artifacts we collect and how we interpret them. For too long, history museums mostly shared the viewpoints of people with power and privilege, leaving the experiences and contributions of many communities out of the narrative. As we move forward with equity and inclusion as priorities, CHM is finding creative ways to engage the public with marginalized histories. Recently, CHM's education department launched the Voids Project, which invited teens to discover hidden history and bring it to light.

Voids was influenced by CHM's online experience *Democracy Limited: Chicago Women and the Vote*, which commemorates the centennial of the ratification of the 19th Amendment in 2020. When considering the American suffrage story in Chicago, African American women's activism in support of the vote for women and their simultaneous fight for community betterment have often been left out of the conversation. The historical silence around their contributions—and the destruction and neglect of the physical spaces in which they worked—impacted public memory, leaving harmful voids in the historical record.

In winter 2021, eight teens from across Chicagoland teamed up with a cross section of CHM staff to learn about the work of Black women suffragists and activists.

After researching collections at CHM and other institutions, they speculated on the alternate futures that could have been realized if history had honored them more fully. Working with teaching artists, the teens created a scrapbook that vividly portrays what they learned and how it inspired them. 

The Chicago History Museum has thousands of items related to the Great Chicago Fire in its collection. From charred keepsakes to firefighting equipment, the artifacts bring the rich narrative of this pivotal disaster to life. Here is a sneak peek of items that will be on display in *City on Fire: Chicago 1871*:



### FIREFIGHTER'S HELMET

Made from leather and metal, this helmet belonged to Chicago Fire Marshal William H. Musham. It was an essential piece of protective equipment for 19th century firefighters.

### MINIATURE BELL

Some people made souvenirs out of artifacts that survived the fire to sell to the public. This miniature bell was made from the large bell at the Courthouse and City Hall building destroyed in the fire.

### MARBLES MELTED TOGETHER

Many kids had to escape quickly from the fire, leaving their toys behind. After the fire, people picked up toys they found in the rubble.

## COSTUME COUNCIL

The Costume Council has demonstrated great agility navigating the shifting landscape of fundraising, exceeding its historical benchmarks. ## THE GUILD

The Guild concluded another great year of fundraising, fulfilling their second installment of \$100,000 toward their three-year \$250,000 pledge in support of the Richard M. and Shirley H. Jaffee History Trail. The Guild Rain Garden on the Jaffee History Trail, opening in October 2021, will feature a lush garden of natural plants and pollinator attractors such as buttonbush, nodding onion, and wild blue iris.

Individuals who support the Guild Annual Appeal with gifts totaling \$1,000 or more between July 2021 and June 2022 will have their names inscribed on a permanent plaque in the Guild Rain Garden. An honor roll of donors is listed on p. 14.

In September 2021, the Guild welcomed Ann Keating, the Dr. C. Frederick Toenniges Professor of History at North Central College and author of *The World of Juliette Kinzie: Chicago Before the Fire*. Dr. Keating, one of the foremost experts on nineteenth-century Chicago, offered a moving portrait of a trailblazing woman. The Guild enjoyed Keating's musings on her book and interpretation of Chicago before and after this transformative event in 1871.

On October 8, 2021, The Guild is hosting its party, "A Hot Time in the Old Town," to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the start of the Great Chicago Fire and the opening of CHM's newest exhibition, *City on Fire: Chicago 1871*. The evening will include combustible cocktails, dinner, and a program featuring Carl Smith, Professor Emeritus of English and history at Northwestern University and author of *Chicago's Great Fire: The Destruction and Resurrection of an Iconic American City*. The Guild will also welcome Annette Nance-Holt, Chicago's first female fire commissioner, as an honored guest at this special event.

## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

### Lisa Hall-Schilling

While her career in the modeling and fashion industries has taken her all over the globe, Lisa Hall-Schilling has always had a special love for her hometown Chicago.



When she was 11 years old, Lisa's mother and aunt sent her to Cleo Johnson, the nation's first Black-owned modeling and charm school, and she walked in her first runway show in New York City. She graduated from John Robert Powers modeling and acting academy at age 17, and eventually became an international model with the esteemed Ebony Fashion Fair. In this role, Lisa traveled to Turkey,

Japan, Italy, and Germany during the 1980s to early 2000s. She graced ads for I. Magnin, Marshall Fields, and Sears and worked with top names in fashion, such as Hubert de Givenchy, Louis Feraud, and the House of Dior. Lisa was living abroad when she retired as a model and became a mother to two boys.

Upon her return to Chicago in 2003, Lisa was looking for ways to reconnect with the city. Around 2013, a friend mentioned that the Chicago History Museum was looking for volunteer docents to take visitors around the exhibitions. Intrigued, Lisa interviewed and was shocked to discover the Museum was looking for guides for their upcoming exhibition, *Inspiring Beauty: 50 Years of Ebony Fashion Fair*. The show even featured a dress Lisa wore on the runway. It was kismet!

Nearly a decade later, Lisa is still volunteering at CHM, and she loves to share her knowledge about Chicago with our visitors. "People don't realize how amazing Chicago is. They walk by history every day and don't realize what happened there or around that street corner. It's so important," says Lisa.

"I will continue to volunteer at the Museum and share these stories as long as I can."

# RICHARD M. AND SHIRLEY H. JAFFEE HISTORY TRAIL

After months of construction, the Chicago History Museum is proud to unveil the **Richard M. and Shirley H. Jaffee History Trail** to the public in October 2021. An interpretative trail and gathering place for the community, this 4.5-acre park includes nearly 150 new trees, a collection of kinetic sculptures designed by local artist Bernard Williams, and seven history stations. Each installation along the 600-foot pedestrian pathway around the Museum follows the theme “Chicago is...” and highlights the city’s resilient, bold, and complex personality.

**Chicago is...Complex** challenges visitors to consider the many ways we share history and how the stories we tell reflect what we value in the present.



**Chicago is...Curious** reminds us that history is everywhere in Chicago, even underground. This stop features the Couch tomb, a visible reminder that Lincoln Park was once the site of the City Cemetery.



**Chicago is...Zhegagoynak** recognizes that before there was a city as we know it, this area was a thriving center of Indigenous life. This stop acknowledges the land rights of the Indigenous people in our communities and their contributions to the city as it is today.



**Chicago is...Resilient** describes the city after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. This stop features the fire relic—the melted contents of a hardware and cutlery store, which weighs more than 13,000 pounds.



**Chicago is...Connected** highlights Chicago’s trade routes and railroads and its role as a transportation hub and gathering place for people for thousands of years.



**Chicago is...Community** features kinetic sculptures by Chicago artist Bernard Williams based on symbols of our community crowdsourced from neighborhoods all over Chicago. CHM partnered with 15 Chicago Park District Cultural Centers to develop concepts for each design.



**Chicago is...Natural** showcases Chicago’s close relationship with nature, featuring a lush garden of native plants and pollinators that works as a natural water collection area for the park.
